Dear Families,

I am delighted to share with you the school's latest Ofsted report, from the inspection that took place in February 2025 (attached in the email and also available on the school website). The report confirms that Western Road continues to be a GOOD school in all areas.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank the entire staff team who work relentlessly to provide a safe, nurturing and engaging learning environment for the children. I would also like to thank you as parents and carers who are a key members of the school community. The inspector shared some of your lovely comments with the leadership team and it was heartwarming to hear how much the school means to you all. Finally, thank you must also go to the incredible children who were excellent ambassadors for the school. The inspectors stated the children "describe the school as 'kind', 'welcoming', 'fantastic' and 'fun'"

Thank you to everyone for your support and contributions during our World Book Week activities last week. The children had a wonderful time sharing stories with their peers, visiting different classrooms to read with each other, guessing the 'masked readers' and dressing up as their favourite book characters. The cake competition was a resounding success and has raised £416.28 and those proceeds will fund purchasing books for the school and class libraries! Thank you to the English team to plan the events and everyone who helped throughout the week.

Huge thanks also go to Mrs Hamilton who has raised money through the 'Lost Flowers' card and badge sales at Seedy Saturday and Lewes Climate Hub: This year's cards feature the artwork from last year's Year Fives - who chose to raise awareness about river pollution by drawing and researching species that use or live in rivers. We were also lucky enough to exhibit this artwork in the window of Lewes Tourist information last summer, and it got very positive feedback from the Lewes community. Like last year's cards, there is a QR code on the back of this year's cards linking to the reports and research the children carried out about their assigned species. This means that anyone who sends a card will be helping to spread the word about the impact of pollution on our waterways, and anyone who receives one will have the opportunity to access detailed information about the wildlife found in British rivers. We are very proud of the children's beautiful work, and are so pleased for this additional opportunity to share it beyond the school gates. We have made approximately £270 and all profits made from this year's sales will be put towards further arts and outdoors enrichment projects at school.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Year 4 parent Tonka Peeva, who came into school and photographed all of the artwork as part of the production process, and also Year 6 parent Lee Woodgate, who edited the photographs to produce the cards. Both Lee and Tonka dedicated a great deal of time and support to this project and we are delighted with the end result. I would also like to thank all of the other parents and carers who responded to the callout I made some months ago for Photo Shop Users to help with the production of these cards. These projects really would not be possible without the support and skills of our families, and I am always so appreciative of the generosity of our school community with regards to sharing their time, skills and expertise.

On Tuesday, 25th February, we were treated to visitors from the Bach Choral Society, along with Ed Davey (parent), who sang some of Bach's St Matthew's Passion with the children. Sir John Tomlinson led the singing in German and so the children were able to experience Bach in the

original language with a renowned artist. Thank you so much to the Bach Choral Society and Ed Davey for organising this enriching experience!

Whole school reminder: As the weather is so changeable, please ensure your child continues to come to school in appropriate uniform and footwear (see below for full details), *all clearly named*:

- Children should have their hair tied back if it reaches their shoulders.

Attendance and Punctuality



In August 2024, the Government published the statutory guidance on attendance (see link below). As per the guidance, parents and carers are expected to:

Ensure their child attends every day the school is open except when a statutory reason applies;

Notify the school as soon as possible when their child has to be unexpectedly absent (e.g. sickness);

Only request leave of absence in exceptional circumstances and do so in advance;

Book any medical appointments around the school day where possible.

Please ensure your child arrives at school on time - the gates open at 8.40am and close at 8.50am. Any child arriving after this time must be signed in at the School Office, as per our health and safety and attendance policies.

Reminder - school uniform



Western Road Community Primary School's Uniform consists of:

- Navy school fleece with school logo (optional but these are very warm and ideal for Winter and Spring)
- Navy school jumper with or without school logo or navy or mid-grey cardigan
- White shirt/blouse with long or short sleeves with or without logo or
- White or navy blue polo shirt with or without school logo
- Mid-grey or navy trousers or smart shorts, or
- Mid-grey or navy skirts (or skorts), pinafore dresses or school summer dresses (blue/white check)
- White/navy/grey socks or tights
- Plain black or navy school shoes (or plain black or navy trainers with no logos); plain sandals in the Summer terms only.
- Plain hair accessories (optional and in school colours preferably). Long hair (past shoulder length) must be tied back.

PE kit:

- White T-shirt or polo shirt with school logo (or plain)
- Grey or navy shorts or jogging bottoms (plain with no logos)
- Trainers or plimsolls

Please note, hoodies and jewellery (apart from a wristwatch when appropriate or stud earrings that can be taken out for PE) are not part of the school uniform and must not be worn in school.

The school also has school caps, rucksacks and book bags available. Please ensure all items of clothing are named including shoes or trainers.

Second-hand items are regularly available at low cost at school fairs and events.

Reminder - Message from the Bursar, Sarah Clifford

Please ensure your ParentPay accounts for dinner money are cleared at the end of each week, or (ideally) are in credit by a small amount. **School dinners cost £2.97 per day for children in Years 3 - 6.**

Children under 5 are entitled to free school milk each day, given at morning snack time (this is in addition to milk given to children who have school lunches). If you would like your child to receive milk, either as they are under 5 or at an additional cost, please do visit https://www.coolmilk.com/parents/ for more information and to register your child.

If you think your child might be entitled to **Free School Meals** (regardless of their age) through the **Pupil Premium Grant**, please do look at https://www.eastsussex.gov.uk/education-learning/schools/school-life/school-meals/free-school-meals for more information. If your child is entitled to Free School Meals and/or the Pupil Premium Grant, the school will receive additional funding to support them with their learning and enrichment activities.

All school trips and school-run clubs (for example Sewing Club) through Arbor so please do make sure you are able to login. We will continue to use ParentPay for Chartwells payments.

School Council

News from Silver Birch (EYFS)

Silver Birch class have come back to school full of excitement and enthusiasm. This term we will be finding out about farms. We have spoken about the children's experiences of farms. The children were able to name several animals that you may see on a farm as well as engaging in some discussions around the role of a farmer. As a class, we have generated questions we would like to find answers to. Questions included 'Why are animals on farms?' 'What machines are used on a farm?' 'How do sheep dogs help the farmer?' and 'Why do they have barns?' We will be finding the answers using a range of resources as well as finding out more information along the way!

News from Elm Class (Year 1)



Term 4 in year 1 is all about plants and growing. The children have planted seeds to include peas, cucumber and beans. We have sent home an individual runner bean seed for each child to grow their own beanstalk at home. In English we are comparing two stories 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and 'Jack and the Baked Beanstalk'. We have been identifying the similarities and differences between each story in particular the characteristics of the main characters. In computing we are making our own information text using book creator. The children have created their front cover and will add more information as they learn about what a seed needs in their Science lessons.

News from Cherry Class (Year 2)



Year 2 have made a fantastic start to their new topic, *The Great Fire of London*, and are thoroughly enjoying their learning. They have been busy researching the event, bringing it to life through drama, and are now in the process of writing their own newspaper reports.

In Science, we have been exploring different materials, with a particular focus on those that can be recycled. The children have been using recycled materials to create some wonderful models—thank you to everyone who has sent items in! As part of our Art lessons, the children have been creating stunning pastel pictures of fire, and soon, they will begin designing and building their own Tudor houses, ready for our exciting burning event later in the term.

News from Larch Class (Year 3)



Year 3s have had a great start back to Term 4. We enjoyed our new topic 'Africa' and already had some inspiring shares about the continent. On Mondays, we have had the pleasure of being taught dance by Ms Zara Breeze. The children have explored various movements that are often in some African dances and are learning choreography to a remix of the Lion King's 'Ah Zabenya'.

News from Willow Class (Year 4)



Year 4 had an amazing time stepping back in history for Roman Day! Dressed in togas, tunics, and even Roman soldier outfits, we truly looked the part. We played *Terni Lapilli* (Roman Tic-Tac-Toe), discovering that the Romans enjoyed simple yet strategic games just like we do today!

Creativity flowed as we designed and crafted Roman shields, which we then put to the test in battle formations. The tortoise (testudo) and wedge formations were our absolute favourites, helping us understand how Roman soldiers stayed strong in battle.

To bring Roman mythology to life, we created comic strips retelling the legendary story of Romulus and Remus, exploring how Rome itself was founded.

It was an action-packed day full of learning, fun, and a true taste of ancient Rome!

News from Elder Class (Year 5)

During the last week of Term 3, Year 5 had a fantastic trip to Battle Abbey! We started with a brilliant workshop about the background story of the battle, all the claimants to the throne and how they related to each other. We were then shown a fascinating array of Anglo Saxon and Norman weapons, including shields, axes, spears, bows, arrows and swords, similar to those that would have been used in the real Battle of Hastings nearly 1,000 years ago.

Following this the children had the opportunity to re-enact the battle itself, taking part as either a Norman or a Saxon soldier, and the history experts on site showed us all how the battle was eventually won by Duke William of Normandy, with Harold being killed in exactly the same spot that we were standing (according to the story).

Later in the day, we took a closer look at the abbey, which was built by William to enable monks to pray for his soul, ensuring he would enter heaven despite all the bloodshed of the conquest. The children also had a lovely time playing on the battle-themed playground and looking around the discovery centre.

As teachers we were so impressed with the children's excellent learning and behaviour throughout the whole day, and especially with their thoughtful contributions and questions during our battle workshop. Well done Year 5!

News from Oak Class (Year 6)



This week in Year 6, we had the privilege of going to Newhaven Fort to deepen our knowledge about World War II. We handled real artefacts from the Home Front and tried to figure out what they were used for, explored the different exhibitions about different aspects of life in Britain during the Blitz and even ventured through the tunnels deep beneath the Fort!

We learned a lot about the important role Newhaven Fort played during the war and can't wait to apply our new knowledge as we continue to learn about World War II as part of our topic this term.

Patina Update



Patina Update for Year 6 Parents

There's lots coming up for our Year 6 children this year and it's time to get going with Patina fundraising and events. Here's what's happening so far:

Fundraising: each Year 6 child is targeted with raising £20 in any way that they find fun. A sponsored bike ride, a lemonade stand, a toy sale - anything goes. Reminder - football kits (Thursdays)



Children who attend Albion In The Community after-school club on Thursdays should come to school in their usual school uniform and school shoes/plain black trainers. Reminder: Child Protection and Safeguarding



At Western Road Community Primary, all staff take child protection and safeguarding children very seriously, both in person and online. All staff have been trained in Safeguarding and Child Protection. If you have any concerns about a child's well-being, bullying or e-safety, please contact the Designated Safeguarding Leads (DLSs): Mrs Hamilton or Mrs Wooler.

During Assemblies, we have reminded all children that if they are worried or anxious at any time, they can talk to any trusted adult in school and who the DSLs are too.

As a school we are also part of Operation Encompass which is a police and education early information safeguarding partnership enabling schools to offer immediate support to children experiencing domestic abuse. Operation Encompass ensures that there is a simple telephone call or notification to a school's trained Designated Safeguarding Lead /Officer (known as key Adult) prior to the start of the next school day after an incident of police attended domestic abuse where there are children related to either of the adult parties involved. Information is shared with a school's Key Adult (Designated Safeguarding Lead or Officer) prior to the start of the next school day after officers have attended a domestic abuse incident. This sharing of information enables appropriate support to be given, dependent upon the needs and wishes of the child. To find out more information, please see: https://www.operationencompass.org/
